Foreword

This report shares the results of the 2025 Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) for Parkview Health. The Health Services and Informatics Research (HSIR) team at the Mirro Center for Research and Innovation led data collection and analysis efforts for this report. HSIR worked with Parkview and community leaders to prioritize health needs, reflecting the voice of community members.

This report is divided into sections identified by orange banners for headings. The report will first give context about the CHNA process, how primary data was collected from the community, how secondary data was analyzed to support the report and a demographic overview. Next, the report integrates primary and secondary data focused on social drivers of health and key health behaviors. Finally, the outcomes from the community prioritization sessions are presented.

It is important to note that the data presented in this report is just a snapshot and there may be supplemental data about the county not presented. While every effort was made to thoroughly understand the health of the community, information gaps may persist due to variations in geography and time span of data collection across different sources.

The Parkview team hopes that the findings from this report help to identify current needs to support the health and well-being of the community. Past and current reports for all counties, along with prioritization session presentations and implementation strategies, can be found on the Parkview website. 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
ABOUT PARKVIEW HEALTH



Parkview Health is a not-for-profit, community-based health system. It serves a population of more than 1.3 million in northeast Indiana and northwest Ohio. With more than 16,000 employees, Parkview is the region's largest employer. Parkview started as Fort Wayne City Hospital and has been serving the community since 1878. Parkview Health formed in 1995, and the heritage of care and compassion continues today with 14 hospitals and over 200 outpatient centers and physician offices.

Parkview Health has a mission to improve health and inspire well-being in the communities we serve.

For the purposes of this Community Health Needs Assessment, the Parkview Health service area consists of the counties where a full-service Parkview hospital is located. This includes Allen, DeKalb, Huntington, Kosciusko, LaGrange, Noble, Wabash and Whitley Counties in Indiana and Williams County in Ohio.



INTRODUCTION TO CHNA PROCESS

The goals of the Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) are to learn about the health needs of the community and create plans to address those needs. In this CHNA for Parkview Health, several types of data were gathered to accomplish this:

- Surveys
- Focus groups
- Secondary data (through Metopio, a health data tool)

These data sources were chosen to broadly understand the community's health. We looked at needs across income level, race, ethnicity, age (18 years and older) and rural and urban areas. After all data was gathered and analyzed, the top health needs were shared with each community. Representatives selected the most important needs to address from 2025 to 2028.

Attention was given to learning the needs of specific groups, major health concerns and service gaps based on feedback from the community and key informants.

Priority Health Needs

Through a step-by-step process, we identified the top needs in each county.

LaGrange County's Top Five Health Concerns

- Access to Mental Health Care and Addiction Services
- Insurance for Health Care
- Housing Affordability
- Mental Health and Mental Disorders
- Obesity



Community and hospital leaders took part in a prioritization process to select the needs that were most pressing, widespread and fit for intervention. The top chosen needs for Parkview Health, LaGrange County were Access to Care, Mental Health and Mental Disorders and Obesity. Mental Health was selected as the Parkview systemwide priority.



The CHNA identifies the greatest health needs in the region. It also helps find ways to address those needs in a manner that aligns with Parkview's mission, expertise and resources.

Since 2012, the CHNA has taken place every three years in accordance with the Affordable Care Act. It has helped Parkview Health understand the community's changing health needs. Since 2022, the CHNA has been led by the Health Services and Informatics Research (HSIR) group at Parkview's Mirro Center for Research and Innovation.

The CHNA helps Parkview learn more about what health concerns are important to the communities we serve in three ways:



1. Understand Community Needs

Pinpoint the health and social problems that each community faces.



2. Prioritize Needs

Guide strategic plans based on what each community needs most.



3. Identify Resources and Challenges

Determine what is available and what is missing to address needs.



Conducting the Assessment

Parkview Health's HSIR team carried out the CHNA from February 2024 to September 2025. By using various data sources, we identified the top health needs in the community. We compared needs at the county level with those of the Parkview Health service area and the entire state. Findings were shared with the community and hospital partners to determine which health needs were most pressing.



Primary Data

Data were collected from the community using **surveys** and **focus groups**. The survey included questions aimed at both the respondent's personal health problems as well as their perceptions about top health concerns and other aspects impacting community well-being. Survey data was gathered from both people living in the community and individuals ("key informants") working for organizations that serve the community (e.g., schools, hospitals). Focus groups were held with a subset of community members and were used to gather deeper insights and experiences through conversation, allowing people to share thoughts that might not be mentioned in survey answers.

Community Survey Overview

- Carried out from September 2024 to December 2024
- Completed by 5,030 residents and 960 key informants in the Parkview Health service area, including 406 residents and 111 key informants in LaGrange County
- Collected from residents aged 18 and older
- Available online and on paper in English, Spanish, Burmese, Karen and Arabic
- Shared through MyChart patient portal, mail, in-person, press release and blog posts
- Collected at in-person events: festivals, sporting events, health fairs for seniors, families and those experiencing homelessness, food banks, YMCAs, public libraries & markets
- Twenty questions for residents and nine questions for key informants
- Assessed demographics, top health concerns, top quality of life concerns, health care access, mental health and digital access
- Aimed to include people of all ages (18+), races, ethnicities, income levels and the urban-rural continuum

Focus Group Overview

- Carried out from March 2025 to May 2025
- Thirty-four focus groups held during local Community Forums across the Parkview Health service area
- Five to 15 people in each focus group
- Participants were 18 years and older, from diverse backgrounds and provided a range of services to community members
- Each hospital's community health leaders sent email invites to participants
- Aimed to understand top community health needs, related barriers and available resources and solutions for addressing health needs

Secondary Data

The Metopio platform helped us gather data from several public sources. Combined with survey and focus group findings, this data helped us better understand each community's health landscape. We used Metopio to examine health behaviors, outcomes and social factors across groups. This allowed us to pinpoint the areas of greatest need within the Parkview Health service area. For each health theme, data is reported using the most recent five-year average or single year of data.







SOCIAL DRIVERS OF HEALTH (SDOH)



Healthy People 2030 defines social drivers of health (SDOH) as the conditions in the environments where people are born, live, learn, work, play, worship and age. These conditions affect a wide range of health, functioning and quality-of-life outcomes and risks. The five domains of SDOH include economic stability, education access and quality, health care access and quality, neighborhood and built environment and social and community context. For this report, the primary and secondary data are presented in order of the SDOH topics.

Access to Care

LaGrange County, IN

Access to care refers to the resources a community has to meet a range of health needs. Examples include having insurance and available health care providers.

What we heard from the community³

- There are not enough doctors or clinics. Some people have to wait weeks or drive far just to see a doctor.
 - "For many cases, we have to leave our county to get care."
- It is hard to find doctors who speak your language, especially for Arabic and Spanish speakers. This makes it hard to explain health problems.
- **Doctors are getting older,** and new ones often don't want to move to small towns.
- Even with insurance, **people struggle to pay** co-pays and deductibles.
- People don't always know how to get help. There's no easy way to find out what services are available.

People in LaGrange County have **less access** to primary care and specialty providers (lower rate per 100,000 residents) when compared to Indiana (75.8 / 77.8) and those living in the Parkview Health service area (62.8 / 50.3). People in LaGrange County also have **less access** to pharmacies than those living in the Parkview Health service area (23.5) and those across Indiana (25.9).²

CHNA survey respondents in LaGrange County said they had a hard time getting the health care they needed. About **1 in 5** had a hard time getting in to see a provider who specializes in a particular illness (e.g., heart conditions), while around **1 in 7** had a hard time getting an appointment with a primary care provider.³

Food Access

LaGrange County, IN

Many factors can affect access to fresh, healthy and affordable food. These include how far someone lives from a grocery store, the presence of school lunch programs and if fruits and vegetables are available.



Access to food is an important social factor that affects health. 'Food Access' can be measured by many factors, such as the number of residents who are food insecure, households receiving SNAP (food stamp) benefits and those who are in poverty not receiving SNAP.

The **rate of food insecurity** in LaGrange County (11.5%) is **lower** than the Parkview Health service area (13.9%) and Indiana rates (15.1%).

Rates are highest in the Hispanic/Latino community (19.0%).¹

What we heard from the community³

- There are not enough grocery stores. Some towns don't have any, so people drive far for food.
- Healthy food is sent away. Local farms ship organic food out instead of selling it nearby.
- It is hard to find affordable, healthy food. Junk food is cheaper and easier to get.
- Low-income families and vulnerable groups—like seniors or those without cars—have a **harder time getting healthy food close to home.**

Housing

LaGrange County, IN

The quality and cost of housing directly impact well-being. If housing is too expensive or if there are too many empty or crowded homes, it can lead to problems like losing one's home or becoming homeless. These issues can affect a person's health.

What we heard from the community¹

- There are not enough homes. Families can't find places to live, especially near schools or jobs.
- Houses cost too much. Even small homes are out of reach for many families.
- Most jobs are limited to one major industry, and wages are stagnant.
 "We are a community that relies on the manufacturing of RVs. When that runs out [it impacts our entire community]"
- There is a **need for increased support** from the government and private investors to build new homes.

Transportation

LaGrange County, IN

Not having transportation can make it difficult for people to get to the doctor, work, school and grocery stores that have healthy food options. This can lead to poor health outcomes and social isolation.

What we heard from the community¹

- Transportation services are extremely limited.
- Public/community transportation is only available from 8 AM-4 PM, while industry jobs often start at 4 AM.

The lack of transportation in LaGrange County is **higher** than that of Indiana (8.5%) and the Parkview Health service area (8.2%).²







Socio-Economic Factors

Violent crime includes homicide, criminal sexual assault, robbery, aggravated assault and aggravated battery.

For this CHNA report, primary and secondary data were gathered and analyzed around the top health themes and concerns listed above. The report highlights the county's key statistics from surveys and secondary data. Key insights gathered through focus groups are also included. A closer look at the data for each of these themes will be provided in this report.

Overall Health

LaGrange County, IN

Overall health refers to how well people feel both physically and mentally. This includes factors like how long people live, self-reported health and quality of life.

- In LaGrange County, people tend to **live longer** than those in the Parkview Health service area (76.0 years) and Indiana (75.1 years).¹
- Around 15.2% of adults in LaGrange County say they have poor physical health, which is **slightly more** than Indiana (12.9)³ and the Parkview Health service area (13.0%).²
- **Fewer** adults in LaGrange county **visit the doctor regularly** compared to those in Indiana (76.9%)³ and the Parkview Health service area (75.6%).²

Chronic Disease

LaGrange County, IN

Chronic diseases and related factors often cause the greatest burden on health in a community. This includes conditions like diabetes, heart disease, asthma and obesity. The following conditions are highlighted due to prevalence, mortality trends and concern from community and key informant survey respondents.

In LaGrange County, the diagnosis rates for many chronic diseases are **similar** to the rates in the Parkview Health service area and Indiana. However, for many chronic diseases, mortality rates are **lower** in LaGrange County than in Indiana and the Parkview service area. An exception is diabetes, for which the mortality rate is **higher** in LaGrange County than in Indiana but **lower** than that of the Parkview Health service area. What we heard from the community²

- Many people don't fully understand chronic diseases like obesity, diabetes or heart problems. Some believe myths—such as thinking obesity is only about willpower.
- **Preventive care is often missed,** especially in low-income families. This can lead to late detection of serious health issues.
 - "My concern is, can people afford their copays even if they do have insurance?"
- Misinformation and lack of support from families, schools or community programs make it hard to build and maintain healthy habits.

Behavioral Health

LaGrange County, IN

Behavioral health refers to a state of mental, emotional and social well-being or behaviors and actions that affect wellness. It also includes how people get support and treatment. Behavioral health is an overarching term that refers to mental health (well-being, mental health conditions), suicidality and substance use disorders.

Mental Health Conditions

LaGrange County's rate of alcohol-related mortality is 7.9 (per 100,000 residents), which is **lower** than the Parkview Health service area (14.6) and Indiana (13.3) rates.²

What we heard from the community⁴

- There is **stigma** with seeking care for mental health and addiction. People often report feeling ashamed to ask for help.
 - "We all love our small community but hard to share as feel others might look down on you."
- There are **no local inpatient or long-term** mental health facilities. This leaves both children and adults without nearby crisis care.
- Emergency and medical staff often lack training to handle mental health crises effectively.
- Addiction and severe mental illness are often treated like crimes with people being punished instead of being offered treatment.
- Follow-up and ongoing care are limited, placing the burden on families to manage recovery without support.
- The need for approval from community leaders and limited English skills can delay or prevent people from getting care.
- Many in the area have **limited access to phones and the internet.** This makes it hard to schedule, follow up or coordinate care.
- Preventive care is often not seen as important. Many rely on emergency services instead of routine mental health support.

Maternal and Child Health LaGrange County, IN

The health of mothers and children is important to the overall well-being of a community. This can be affected by factors such as limited access to health care, mental health issues and feeling disconnected.

Elder Health

LaGrange County, IN

Elder health focuses on concerns like falls, Alzheimer's disease and other dementias. These problems are often the biggest health challenges for older people.

In LaGrange County, women were nearly four times as likely to die from Alzheimer's than men from 2019-2023.²

In LaGrange County, the rate of deaths from falls is **lower** than the Parkview health Service area (14.3), but **similar** to Indiana (8.3).¹

The rate of deaths due to Alzheimer's in LaGrange County is **below** both the Parkview Health service area rate (35.3) and Indiana's rate (30.2).²

Infectious Diseases

LaGrange County, IN

Infectious diseases are illnesses caused by germs like viruses and bacteria. Public health tools like prevention and vaccination are key to stopping and managing disease outbreaks.

In LaGrange County, **fewer** Medicare beneficiaries received a flu shot than in Indiana (47.0%) and the Parkview Health service area (45.8%). More than half of this population, which is at higher risk of dying from the flu, remains unvaccinated.¹

LaGrange County has **fewer** deaths per 100,000 people from flu and pneumonia than Indiana (10.9) and the Parkview Health service area (11.6).²

Oral and Dental Health



Prioritization Overview

After gathering and analyzing the data—including applying additional weighting to survey responses from individuals identified as part of vulnerable populations—the HSIR team used a structured process to pinpoint the community's most urgent health needs. This process was meant to be inclusive and data-driven, ensuring that the chosen priorities represented both community members' experiences and health trends. The process involved meetings with community stakeholders and final selection of top health needs by hospital leaders.

Community Prioritization Sessions

- Carried out between March 2025 and May 2025 for each hospital.
- Attendees were professionals who provide a wide range of services to community members from diverse backgrounds. (See Appendix B for list of attendees.)
- Ahead of the meeting, attendees were sent a printed scorecard with the top health needs identified for their county and related data.
- Presentation at the meeting covered data trends on the top health needs, with a focus
 on geographic, socioeconomic, racial, ethnic, gender and age-related disparities.
 (These slides are posted on the website where you found this report.)
- Attendees discussed the benefits and challenges to addressing the health needs.
- Attendees voted to rank the top health needs based on significance, severity, relation to social drivers of health and suitability for intervention.

Selected Health Priorities

The list of top health needs from each session and qualitative summaries from Community Forums were shared with Parkview Health - LaGrange County hospital leadership in June 2025. Hospital leaders reached consensus on the final top health priorities with consideration given to resources, prevalence of the health need, impact on vulnerable populations and suitability to address the health need.

Appendix A - Community Impact Report

This report highlights the progress and measurable outcomes of Parkview Health's community outreach initiatives carried out between 2022 and 2024, as guided by our 2023 Implementation Strategy. Each program and service detailed herein reflects our commitment to addressing the key needs identified in the 2022 Community Health Needs Assessment. The following results demonstrate our ongoing dedication to equity, access, and measurable health improvements in the communities we serve. As we reflect on our progress and outcomes, we remain committed to building healthier communities through innovation, partnership and compassionate care.

Mental Health

LaGrange County Mental Health / Substance Use Collaborative

From 2022 through 2024, the LaGrange County Mental Health / Substance Use Collaborative actively worked to assess and address the mental health and substance use disorder needs of the local community. The collaborative was made up of 14 community partners who met monthly to strategize and plan around two key goals: building community awareness and creating opportunities for education and dialogue related to mental health and substance use. The following section outlines the outcomes and impacts of the collaborative's work during the 2022–2024 cycle.

Year-Round Drug Take Back Education

In 2023 and 2024, the collaborative partnered with the LaGrange County Sheriff's Department to disperse 88 drug disposal bags to individuals and organizations throughout LaGrange County. These bags can safely be used to deactivate pills, liquid or patches and help to reduce the likelihood of prescription drug abuse.

Highlighted Outcomes

- In 2023, distributed 151 flyers throughout LaGrange County that identify the drug disposal bins' locations and how to safely dispose of needles
- In 2024, distributed 33 drug disposal bags and 30 flyers throughout the county

QPR (Question, Persuade and Refer) Suicide Prevention Training

When it comes to mental health, early intervention can be the difference between life and death. During a cardiovascular emergency, performing CPR can save a life. In the event of a mental health emergency, QPR can be used in the same manner. The QPR technique is used to recognize the signs that someone is at risk of suicide, to offer hope and refer the person to the care they need. Participants in this program learn warning signs of suicide crisis and how to respond.

Highlighted Outcomes

- Since being implemented in 2017, over 1,500 people have received this education, with 252 people being trained in 2023
- In 2024, the program trained an additional 23 individuals

Crisis Intervention Team

In 2023 and 2024, 40-hour Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) trainings were offered to staff teams throughout the community that work at the scene of crisis situations. CIT training focuses on improving safety and the connections between mental health professionals, individuals with mental health, law enforcement and hospital emergency services through improvements in communication, increased understanding of mental illness and reducing stigma.

Highlighted Outcomes

- LaGrange County held its first ever CIT training in April of 2023 and had 16 participants become certified in crisis intervention
- In 2024, a 40-hour Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training was offered to law enforcement, first responders and mental health providers, reaching a total of 16 graduates

McMillen Health

Parkview partnered with the Harold W. McMillen Center for Health Education in 2022-2024 in an effort to improve the general knowledge around substance use disorders in 100% of program participants. Program participants (K-12 students) discussed making healthy choices, tobacco (all grades), vaping (Grades 6-12) and alcohol (Grades 6-12). In addition, participants learned and practiced self-regulation strategies.

Highlighted Outcomes

- Provided education to 1,000 youth in LaGrange County Schools in 2023
- Provided education to 1,201 students in LaGrange County Schools in 2024


NaloxBox

This project was part of an initiative started by Governor Eric Holcomb in 2021 to improve access to naloxone and reach vulnerable populations more effectively. To accomplish this, Parkview LaGrange Hospital partnered with Overdose Lifeline, Inc., an Indiana nonprofit dedicated to helping those affected by substance use disorder, to install a NaloxBox outside the entrance of the hospital's emergency department.

Highlighted Outcomes

 NaloxBox placement has gone from one unit in January 2023 to having four units throughout LaGrange County by the end of 2023

Cancer Services of Northeast Indiana

In 2024, Parkview LaGrange Hospital partnered with Cancer Services of Northeast Indiana on their Client Advocate Program for LaGrange County. This program intended to educate clients in areas like emotional/mental wellbeing, financial stability and living a healthy lifestyle.

Highlighted Outcomes

- In 2024, 89 clients were served, totaling 95 emotional/mental health support interactions
 - These interactions resulted in 90% of clients stating that they gained and utilized skills learned from the interactions
- In addition to mental health services, the program also helped 16 low-income clients with financial assistance
- Provided 19 head coverings, 212 general health care supplies, 65 cases of nutritional drinks and more

Obesity

LaGrange County Obesity Collaborative

The LaGrange County Obesity Collaborative consists of 11 community partners who met bi-monthly to strategize and develop methods for decreasing the number of those identified as overweight or having obesity in LaGrange County. Their goal is to decrease obesity by increasing nutrition education, healthy choices and participation in physical activities. The following section outlines the outcomes and impacts of the collaborative's work during the 2022–2024 cycle.

McMillen Health

Parkview partnered with the Harold W. McMillen Center for Health Education in 2022-2024 in an effort to improve the general knowledge around healthy living. Youth participating in this program gained access to education, helping them successfully transition into adulthood using the knowledge and skills taught to make healthy choices in nutrition.

Highlighted Outcomes

- In 2022, the program covered topics on media influence on junk food consumption, harmful effects of fad diets, anorexia, bulimia, obesity and education on basic food guidelines. This included reading food labels, understanding fitness facts and learning about preventative health choices.
- In 2024, provided education to 1,201 students (pre-K to 12th grade)
 - Over 40 presentations given
 - According to survey data, 51.01% of students showed an overall knowledge gain

FitKids360

FitKids360 is an eight-week, family-based, healthy living program for children ages five to 17 years with a body mass index (BMI) in the 85th percentile or higher. In 2024, this program provided children and their families with information to help them become and stay healthy and active. FitKids360 was designed to decrease the medical cost of obesity in northeast Indiana and increase community awareness of the problem of childhood obesity. Over 98% of children referred to FitKids360 had a BMI in the 99th percentile or higher.

Highlighted Outcomes

- In 2024, this program maintained an average retention rate of 100% and continued to see growth in the well-being knowledge learned, as well as successful implementation of positive health behaviors by all participants
- Half of all participants in 2024 improved their Family Nutrition and Physical Activity (FNPA) scores by at least 5%. This score is used to assess family environmental and behavioral factors that may put a child at risk for obesity.

VeggieRx

In 2024, Parkview LaGrange Hospital partnered with the Parkview Well-Being team to pilot the VeggieRx nutrition prescription program. This program provided produce vouchers to local individuals who are food insecure or are low-income with chronic disease. VeggieRx participants received produce vouchers each month for the duration of the program that could be redeemed at HEAL Farm Markets and other select farmers markets and grocery stores around the area. Additionally, as a part of this program, participants were required to attend education sessions led by registered dietitians where they were taught the health impact of produce consumption and how to make the most of the monthly vouchers.

Highlighted Outcomes

- In 2024, the program distributed \$6,900 in vouchers, with participants redeeming \$4,950
 - Average of \$215 per participant
- In 2024, VeggieRx received 25 referrals from internal and external providers. This resulted in 24 program enrollees, with 18 participants completing all four sessions.

Farm to School

The collaborative partnered with the Parkview Well-Being team in 2023 to bring the Farm to School initiative to LaGrange County. The Farm to School initiative connects students with fresh, locally grown produce, and seeks to introduce a deeper understanding of where food comes from. The program both promotes better nutrition and addresses food insecurity by increasing access to fresh produce in school cafeterias and community programs.

Highlighted Outcomes

- In 2023, partnered with Parkview Well-Being Team and northeast Indiana Farm-To-School to provide harvest of the month taste tests to 5,892 students throughout the LaGrange County Schools
- In 2024, eight schools located in LaGrange County participated in the program, reaching 1,456 students
- Provided education materials on the produce that tied into the teacher's education curriculum, specific to the subject they were teaching

Child Abuse & Neglect

LaGrange County Youth Advocacy Collaborative

A collaborative group was established in 2019 to bring together key stakeholders and community partners from LaGrange County to address the pressing issue of child abuse and neglect. This concern was identified as a top community need in both the 2019 and 2022 Community Health Needs Assessments, based on data measuring the percentage of child abuse and neglect cases and the percentage of children in need of services (CHINS). The following section outlines the outcomes and impacts of the LaGrange County Youth Advocacy Collaborative's work during the 2022–2024 cycle.

Iris Family Support Center

In 2024, Parkview LaGrange Hospital partnered with Iris Family Support Center in support of their Community Outreach team's prevention activities throughout LaGrange County.

Highlighted Outcomes

- In 2024, the Community Outreach team attended the Mama to Bee Community Baby Shower on August 15th, providing supplies and information about community resources to 34 expectant mothers and speaking to 189 people about services
- The Community Outreach team conducted outreach to schools to offer Safe Sitter and Safe at Home programming to students, as well as Trauma-Informed Practices for child care workers
- Currently, inroads are being formed with the Amish community to educate on prenatal care and safe birthing practices
- The Community Outreach team is collaborating with Handle with Care to raise awareness about communication strategies for children who have recently experienced trauma

Thrive by 5

In 2024, Parkview LaGrange Hospital partnered with the LaGrange County Economic Development Corporation to support the Thrive by 5 Early Childhood Coalition to enhance the capacity, quality and affordability of early care and education in LaGrange County. Through collaboration with existing programs, we focused on sustainability and supported providers in exploring expansion or launching new, innovative services. As a result, the county saw an increase in licensed family childcare home providers, including one newly licensed provider and several others considering licensure. Additionally, the Coalition initiated planning and community engagement efforts for a new childcare center to be developed in the heart of LaGrange County.

Highlighted Outcomes

- As a result of this collaboration, 72 new, high-quality childcare seats will be created in a community building owned by the LaGrange County Economic Development Corporation.
 - This creates truly sustainable childcare; if one childcare provider leasing the space closes, the space is still available for another to take over service, ensuring long term availability for much-needed childcare and early learning experiences

Blue Tire Campaign

In 2023, Parkview LaGrange Hospital partnered with the Department of Child Services to promote the Blue Tire Campaign. This was the first year a Blue Tire Campaign was held to raise awareness in the community about child abuse and neglect.

Highlighted Outcomes

- A hashtag was used to track social media traffic from this campaign.
 - Facebook 15 posts with 7 comments, 119 reactions (like, love, etc.) and 23 shares
 - Instagram 1 post with 6 reactions
 - LinkedIn 1 post with 2 reactions

Access to Care

Brightpoint

In 2024, Parkview LaGrange Hospital partnered with Brightpoint on the Covering Kids and Families (CFK) program. This program works to increase access to health care by removing barriers to enrolling in public health coverage and educating on how to use and maintain public health coverage programs.

Highlighted Outcomes

- In 2024, CFK completed 45 applications for LaGrange County residents to obtain insurance under public health coverage programs
- The program also provided 105 support services to LaGrange County residents, achieving a 96.2% retention rate of those enrolled in coverage from 2023 to 2024
